So what do you do mid-morning on a weekday? A congregant recently told me what he does if the going gets tough at his desk and he needs a break. He turns to his e-mail inbox and looks for the daily "ten minute" message of Torah that arrives from our national Reform movement. One day it may be a commentary on the weekly Torah reading. Another day it's a message from Israel. Another day brings an opinion piece on a Jewish matter of current interest.

"I read a few lines," he told me. "And if it looks interesting, I take a few more minutes to read to the end. If not, I get back to work. Either way it barely takes ten minutes, and on the good days I actually manage to learn some Judaism in the midst of a hectic day."

It was a delight to hear this story.

I'm proud that the Union for Reform Judaism provides these daily e-mail resources. (You can learn more by visiting www.urj.org/torah/ ten/) For that matter, I'm proud of another Reform initiative. Several weeks ago the Union published an unprecedented book. It's called The Torah: A Women's Commentary. This magnificent resource brings together the questions and insights of several hundred Jewish women –scholars, clergy, poets, and other writers. The focus is the five books of the Torah, and every one of those books is analyzed and interpreted by women. The best part of the enterprise is that the women really do find aspects of our most ancient book that men alone have not seen. They don't politicize the text or offer polemics. They just bring absolutely refreshing perspectives to the stories we always thought we knew.

Here's the best news: On Saturday, April 5, as part of our Sinai Temple Women's Weekend, Dr. Judith Plaskow will be teaching us about the commentary. Plaskow is a top notch scholar who helped organize the new book. She is brilliant and we'll be privileged to explore this new literary treasure with her.

Message from President Dave Roberts

With sadness, on December 10th I sent a letter to our members announcing Cantor Mekler's decision not to renew her contract which expires on May 31, 2008. In that letter I promised that our Board of Directors would expeditiously begin to define a plan regarding how to go forward. The Board has met and after considerable discussion of this important issue has outlined the following general path:

1.Marlene Gordon has agreed to chair a committee that will plan how to honor Cantor Mekler for her long and distinguished service to Sinai. Marlene may be contacted at jnmgordon@hotmail.com.

2.Rabbi Shapiro will take the lead in ensuring that proper planning, tutoring, etc. for the Bar/Bat Mitzvahs scheduled for June are in place. Rabbi has already personally spoken with each of the affected families.

3.A Search Committee has been formed with past president Mel Chafetz appointed as chair. Over the next few months, we will be working closely with the American Conference of Cantors (ACC-the Reform Movement Cantor's association) placement office to identify potential cantorial candidates. The highlights of the process are:

a.We will file Sinai's application with the ACC Placement Office. The application will be posted on the ACC website for interested cantors to review.

b.The Search Committee will review applications and CD's received from candidates.

c.Phone interviews will be conducted with selected candidates Probably two to four candidates will be asked to meet in person with the Search Committee. Representatives from the Search Committee may observe finalist candidates in their current pulpit.

d.Ideally, the Search Committee will identify one or two candidates who best meet our requirements. The candidate(s) will be presented to the Board of Directors for final approval.

e.Assuming Board approval, a contract with the new cantor would be finalized.

f.We would like the new cantor to begin service at Sinai between July 1, 2008 and September 1, 2008.

g.If for some reason, the above process does not yield an acceptable candidate, the Board has directed that we find an interim cantor for approximately one year, and then repeat the above process.

As we search for a new cantor, we plan to provide opportunities for our members to provide input into the process. During January the Search Committee held two open meetings soliciting input from our members. Your continuing input is welcome. Please feel free to contact Mel or me with any ideas you may have:

Scroll of Life



The Scroll of Life is a work of art in the Oneg Shabbat Room. It was created by Presentations Gallery of New York. The Isaiah quote at the bottom of the Scroll was taken from the Yom Kippur Haftarah as an expression of hope.

The Scroll has space on it so that Sinai members can commemorate either joyous events or memorialize loved ones. Each contribution of a plaque on the Scroll will be used to enrich the life and strength of Sinai. The cost of each plaque is \$200. The inscription may be 3-4 lines with a maximum of 27 spaces per line.

The Sustaining Membership Program 2007-2008

At Sinai Temple, we have always welcomed everyone regardless of financial situation. No one is turned away from our synagogue because he or she lacks the means to pay full dues. To be as fair as possible, we have taken great care in granting dues abatements, recognizing that a reduction for one must be subsidized by an increase to others. In order to assure that membership remains available to all, and to continue meeting the operating expenses of the Temple, we have reinvigorated our Sustaining Membership program.

This fiscal year (2007-2008) we have turned to congregants who were already paying full dues at their category level and asked them to assume their fair share of sustaining Sinai by voluntarily increasing their financial commitment to the congregation. The results have been gratifying. As of January 1, 2008, 99 households have joined the Sustaining Membership program (paying amounts ranging from \$250 to \$2,500 over their required dues). These households have committed a total of \$54,376.00. We are so grateful for their generosity. Recognition for their sustaining membership support can also be seen on the plaque which is in the Temple lobby.
