So much to plan for over the next several weeks: Purim for kids and families, Purim for adults only (Saturday, March 7), Fiddler on the Roof, and Passover.

I'd love to see every one in our community at one event or maybe two. Grownups, in particular, call the Temple office today to see if there is room at our Adult Purim Mardi Gras. It would be so nice to wish you L'chaim over a Cajun Cocktail!

And how about Fiddler on the Roof? Our cast under the direction of Sheri Levson has been working hard to bring us the wonderful musical that tells the story of our ancestors in mythic, turbulent, traditional Anatevka. On Friday, March 27, we are even offering a Shabbat Service to precede the evening performance.

Then comes Passover - our annual opportunity to tell the greatest story ever told, to soak in memories and friendship, and to proclaim the belief that goodness has an ultimate chance to triumph.

To help you make Passover significant, I'll once again be offering readings and suggestions for the Seder on our Temple website. The material should be available in a few days at www.sinai-temple.org.

I am also inviting you...actually urging you...to come to the Passover Morning Service on Saturday, April 4 at 10:30 a.m..

Why does this matter to me? It matters because Passover is the story of our people and community and we do it best when we all come together. We need 200 people at services because that's how important Passover is on a community basis. We need YOU. Actually, you may even need us! Together, we create a presence. Together, we feel stronger. Together, we are larger than the sum of our parts. Something intangible happens that elevates us and energizes us in a celebratory, spiritual way.

One of my favorite teachers, Larry Hoffman, recently challenged his students by suggesting that American Jews squander Passover. Hoffman said we trivialize the holiday. We replace the message of freedom and hope with nothing more than fun and call it a day.

Let's not do that this year. Study the Haggadah. Borrow some haggadahs from the Temple. Worship with Cantor Levson and me. Make it real.

I wish you a wonderful holiday. Chag Sameach.

Theodore Bikel starred as Tevye in that production. He made quite an impression on me! This March, I will have the awesome and extraordinary privilege of playing the role of Tevye for Sinai Temple's production of *Fiddler on the Roof!* Theo's shadow still looms large in my memory, but I will do my best to do justice to this iconic character of Yiddish literature and the American Musical Theater. 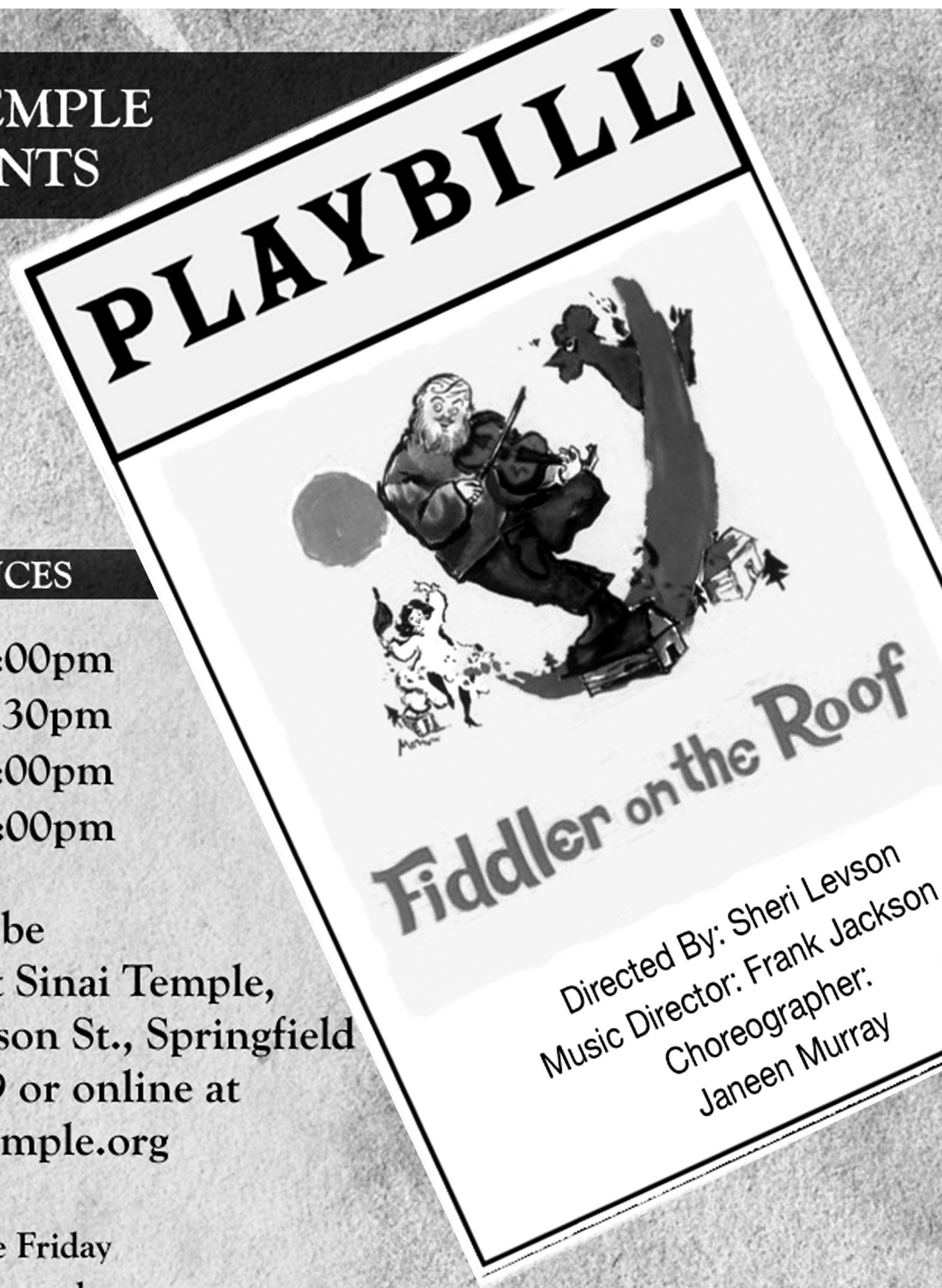

Coming Soon To Venues Nearby: The Pioneer Valley Jewish Film Festival!

April 12 to April 26

The TENTH annual Pioneer Valley Jewish Film Festival offers a two-week run with 19 fabulous films plus guest speakers.

Watch for **Bethlehem**, winner of six Israeli Academy Awards, which follows the complex relationship between a Mossad agent and his Palestinian informant; **Run Boy Run**, directed by Pepe Danquart, which tells the true story of a Polish boy's fight for survival during the Holocaust; and **24 Days**, a thriller about the kidnapping of a French Jew that sheds light on contemporary European anti-Semitism.

Other notable films at this year's festival will include the New England premiere of **My Italian Secret: The Forgotten Heroes**, which tells the story of Tour de France cycling champion Gino Bartali and other Italians who saved lives during World War II; **Cupcakes**, a feel-good, kitschy musical comedy from celebrated Israeli director Eytan Fox; and **Zero Motivation**, a smart, cynical and charming comedy that won the top prize of Best Narrative Feature at the 2014 Tribeca Film Festival.

The Pioneer Valley Jewish Film Festival is produced by the Springfield Jewish Community Center and is funded in part by a grant from the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. Thank you so much to all who participated in our "Warm the Winter" fundraising efforts. The school raised over \$550.00! Half was donated to the Valley Opportunity Council Fuel Assistance Program and half was donated to our scholarship fund to help some families with tuition costs.

In the spirit of giving, our school recently kicked off the "Great Tzedakah Challenge" friendly fundraising event. Each class is collecting tzedakah each week, in the hope to be the class with the most tzedakah for Rachel's Table at the end of the semester. The class with the most tzedakah in May will be invited to a bagel and hot cocoa breakfast with Rabbi. So far, this friendly competition has proven to be a success. In just the first week of competition, the weekly school tzedakah average more than doubled what it had been during the first semester. I want to reiterate that this is a friendly competition, used to excite our students and remind them to bring in tzedakah. By no means is this meant to be a financial strain on anyone. One teacher had students create paper tzedakah boxes for collecting loose change at home. So far, the kindergarten class is in first place but it's a close race.

Why is the Temple offering this program? We began this program to honor the memory of Susan M. Broh, a Temple member who died in September 2001. Susan began her career of "tikkun olam" by dedicating two years of her life to the Peace Corps. After that, Susan devoted her professional and volunteer life to making this world a better place. She believed passionately in the Jewish obligation of pursuing justice. Susan's friends and family have created this program to honor her memory and to encourage other Jews to strive for holiness as Jews must always do.

A HOME CEREMONY - FOR REMEMBERING THE HOLOCAUST FROM RABBI SHAPIRO

Dear Friends:

When Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) starts on the 27th of Nisan, **the evening of Wednesday, April 15**, there is something simple and beautiful which you can do to commemorate the Holocaust. You can purchase and light a Yahrzeit/Memorial Candle in your home. At that time, you might want to have a moment of silence, use the prayer that follows, or create something of your own. A limited number of candles will be available at the Temple office if you wish to pick one up there. You can also purchase a candle at a grocery store.

A Prayer for Lighting the "Holocaust Candle"

I/we light this memorial candle in order not to forget the lives of the Jewish men, women, and children who are symbolized by its flame. They were brutalized for no reason; their lives were taken in cruelty. May we be inspired to learn about our six million brothers and sisters as individuals and as communities; and may we recall not only the terror of their deaths, but the splendor of so many of their lives. May the memory of their lives inspire us to hallow our own lives, and to live meaningful Jewish lives so that we may help to ensure that part of who they were always endures.
