What if God is a delusion?

What if Nobel laureate, Steven Weinberg, is right when he says, "Anything that scientists can do to weaken the hold of religion should be done and may in the end be our greatest contribution to civilization."

Have you noticed two of the titles on the current New York Times Best Sellers list? Oxford scientist Richard Dawkins has written, "The God Delusion." Sam Harris has become quite the celebrity with his more popular, "The End of Faith."

What both books present is a severe critique of religion. Dawkins, for example, calls one chapter in his book, "Why there almost certainly is no God." Harris argues that human beings have for too long suspended reason in favor of religious belief and then gone on to perform some of the worst atrocities in human history in the name of religion and God.

I must be honest and tell you that, when The End of Faith was first published back in 2004, I borrowed a copy from the library. I read a few pages and found it to be so polemic and strident in tone that I put the book down.

But the book hasn't gone away. Nor has the controversy. That is why the Dawkins and Harris books are best sellers. And this past November a scientific conference took place in La Jolla with this title - Beyond Belief: Science, Religion, Reason, and Survival.

So what do you think?

As Passover approaches, are the authors of these new books taking the place of the Seder's proverbial "wicked" child or are they, like the "wise" child, asking honest, critical questions?

Would you like to ask the same questions? Is God a delusion? Would our world be better off without religion?

Would you be interested in reading either the Dawkins or Harris book with me? I'd actually welcome the opportunity to stretch my mind with you. Let me know if you if you are interested and we'll do some challenging reading together. (markdov@sinai-temple.org)

Greening Your World: A Message from the Social Action Committee

Tikun Olam: To Repair The World! It is in this spirit that the Social Action Committee has taken on the task of informing the congregation of ways in which they can help. Sometimes when many people make small changes—the change can be significant.

At the website: www.ecomail.com/biz/cleaning.htm I found some easy and interesting ways in which you could make a small change. The following is a quote from that site.

Cleaning products can be among the most hazardous chemicals in your home or office and are therefore regulated by the Consumer Product Safety Commission. These products create hazardous waste – threatening human health and the natural environment. Borax, ammonia and baking soda are safe alternatives that can clean and disinfect to meet hospital standards and are much cheaper than name brand cleaners. There are many green products available that are just as effective as traditional ones. Tips:

- Choose products that are biodegradable and non toxic to humans and aquatic life.
- Choose concentrated products, and be sure that they can work in cold water.
- Choose products with VOC concentrations of less than 10% of the weight of the products when diluted for use as directed.
 - Choose products with a neutral pH.
- Choose products in recycled, recyclable and refillable containers and packaging.
- Avoid petroleum-derived ingredients. Instead choose surfactants derived from vegetable oil. Look for d-limonene and pine oil solvents.
- Avoid containing EDTA and NTA. Look for alternatives with sodium citrate, sodium bicarbonate, sodium carbonate, and sodium silicate.
- Avoid phosphates, Choose products with a phosphate concentration of 0.5% or less by weight.

Message from the President Steve Weiss

At our most recent board meetings, we're starting a series of conversations that are designed to explore some of the "big picture" issues so that we can develop priorities for the next few years (and then strategies to fulfill these priorities). We expect that these meetings will culminate in a session facilitated by a representative from the URJ this spring. Obviously, this is a process that won't be finished in one or two meetings, and I'm sure the priorities will evolve over time.

Sinai's leadership is working to create at Sinai's future in other, more specific ways. The Board recently unanimously endorsed the Religious School's proposal to move to single session Sundays; this, obviously, is a momentous (and exciting) change. The Legacy Society is renewing its efforts to facilitate planned giving to ensure Sinai's future. The Membership and Retention Committee is in the process of rolling out a new package for prospective new members. And this is the time of year when the Nominating Committee (chaired by Linda Kay) is putting together the slate of officers and directors for next year, and when the budget for the next year is being developed.

These activities often take place largely behind the scenes; but they're the "nuts and bolts" of maintaining and enhancing our Sinai community. Thanks go to all the Board and Committee members who make this possible.
