

Director of Education

Jewish tradition has always integrated learning and action. Study is integrated into prayer, and prayer and study are sustained by work and action. As it is written in Pirkei Avot: "The world stands on three things: Torah (study), Avodah (worship), and Gemilut Chasidim (acts of loving kindness)..."

Any of you who have ever spoken to me about Sinai's post-Bar/Bat Mitzvah curriculum have heard me rave about our programming for grades 8-10. I truly feel that what our students gain post B'nai Mitzvah in religious school is as important as what they gain when they begin their lifelong journey of Jewish education in grades K -7.

The SPARK *Heart Action* program is just one of the many reasons that I am absolutely crazy about our post Bar/Bat Mitzvah curriculum.

On April 6th, several of our SPARK *Heart Action* participants from this past fall and from years past, got together for a reunion breakfast. The SPARK Heart Action program, which we usually refer to as SPARK is a program that provides our eighth grade students with the opportunity to visit and socialize with senior adult members of our congregation. Each fall semester, through text study and conversation, relationships grow. Students are given a chance to gain a new perspective on their place within their world, and what they can do to improve it. This spring was the first time that we had a reunion for this group. It was so nice to see this group gather together. It was like watching old friends reunite. There was talk about heading to college for the first time and what college was like during World War II. There were announcements of new grandchildren and announcements of making a high school sports team. We all agreed that we were glad our winter was over and that it was nice to catch up with some pals. And in typical Sinai Heart Action fashion, the students got pancakes, fruit, and beverages and served their adult friends. I hope this is the first of many reunions that we hold for our SPARK participants.

Message from Philip Lesser President, Men of Sinai



The Sustaining Membership Program

By the time this bulletin arrives in Sinai homes, letters of invitation should have arrived in the homes of all those congregants who are currently Sustaining Membership participants. We are hoping you will continue your SMP involvement into the 2014/2015 fiscal year. (Our Celebrate Today/Create Tomorrow Campaign actually depends on the continuing health of the Sustaining Membership Program.)

But what if you aren't already in SMP? What is SMP?

If you are among those congregants who pay full dues in your category, you might consider becoming a Sustaining Member of Sinai.

A Sustaining Member is someone who chooses to offer Sinai an extra amount of funds beyond dues. During the current fiscal year, 100 Sinai households became Sustaining Members and contributed over \$68,000 to our budget.

By doing this, the Sustaining Members helped reduce the need to raise the fees for Temple members who cannot afford full dues. By assuming a kind of "fair share," the Sustaining Members also allowed Sinai to continue to offer a full and varied menu of programs.

The levels of involvement are below. Each level assumes a member paying his/her dues and then adding on to those dues the following amounts.


