It's easy to give away \$1000.

It's easy to give away that sum of money when you have fabulous requests for the funds AND when you are acting on behalf of Sinai Temple's Jerome Gurland Human Relations Award.

Let me explain. Back in 1998, the Gurland Award was established to honor Rabbi Jerome Gurland on the 40th anniversary of his rabbinic ordination. At the time, Jerry was the Cultural Liaison and Lecturer in Liberal Arts at Western New England University. He was involved in many facets of Springfield life touching on justice and so we decided to honor him by creating a fund that would "give away" an annual award in the area of justice.

And that is what we have done for all these years. We have maintained the fund through donations and every spring we have given an award to a worthy effort improving life in our community. This year's award goes to Pioneer Valley Project to help them launch a youth committee at Commerce High School that will advocate for better disciplinary procedures. Rather than suspend a student from school so that he/she falls behind academically, the students will be advocating for disciplinary procedures that will allow students to stay in school. The idea is to create a win/win scenario for all concerned.

In previous years, the award has gone to a local African American woman for publishing and distributing a graphic novel against violence. On another occasion, the award went to Gray House helping them underwrite a trip to New York City for their summer day camp. Awards have also gone to the Vietnamese American association in Springfield and to a summer program that taught tennis and Shakespeare to inner city kids.

We have done amazing and positive work through the Gurland Award. I hope you join me in feeling very proud about what our synagogue does for the larger community.

Thanks to Jay Kimmel, Kathy and Joe Dorison, and Maria Markenson who formed this year's Gurland Committee. And thanks to Rabbi Gurland who still inspires us with his wisdom and vision.

Message from Jeff Cossin

"I was hoping that you would call, and yes, I am ready to serve!" Thank you, Jackie Neiman. That was the immediate response I received when I asked Jackie, a previous Executive Committee Recording Secretary, to be cochair of the Rabbinic Search Committee. I first called Steve Sussman, former President and facilitator of the Sinai 2015 focus group discussions, and he agreed enthusiastically to be co-chair. He was thrilled when he learned that Jackie would be his partner. Immediately, Bruce Leshine and I met with both of them to outline the process that would be necessary to choose the Interim Rabbi for 2016-2017 and the Permanent Rabbi for 2017-18. The Executive Committee along with Steve and Jackie will choose the members of the Search Committee with final Board approval. I am confident that the Search Committee will do its work well and involve everyone in the congregation in its deliberations.

What will happen during the 2016-2017 Interim year? Sinai Temple will continue to be the Sinai Temple we all love. This will happen because our Temple leadership is organized and committed to the future of our Temple. This will also happen because Cantor Levson will be a continuing presence as our Cantor. Sinai will also continue to be a lively and energetic congregation because all of the members of our Community will continue to do all the things that are done on a day to day basis.

During the 2016-2016 year, there will also be a full time ordained Reform rabbi living in our community. He or she will be our "interim" rabbi. This rabbi will have special training in helping congregations transition after a rabbi has been in place for as long Rabbi Shapiro has been. Many congregations across the United States hire interim rabbis because interim rabbis help congregations continue their sacred work even as they help the congregation prepare for new chapters in their future. The interim Rabbi will not become our Permanent Rabbi.

One of our congregants asked me what I will be doing after I leave office. Karen and I have some plans (exercising, I understand, is on the top of her long list of things for me to do!). But we will be totally engaged with our Sinai Community. Karen will be Recording Secretary on the Executive Committee and I will remain active on the Long Range Planning Committee and the Sinai Temple-Temple Beth El Educational Task Force. We will light Shabbat candles on Friday evening and will be frequent attendees at Shabbat services and Torah Study on Saturday morning. Sinai Temple and Judaism will remain central in our lives. We will be greeters when asked and we will look forward to seeing all of you. We will welcome our Interim Rabbi and welcome our new Permanent Rabbi when that happens.

I thank all of you for making the last four years a rewarding and creative experience.

PROJECT SOLEL: Creating a New Path to Educate Our Children

As we have previously shared with you, Sinai Temple and Temple Beth El have been engaged in serious discussions about joining together to create a shared religious school serving the children of both our congregations. We are now delighted to share that we have moved beyond **if we should do this**—and are now committed to working together on **how we will make this vision into a successful reality.** Much work and detailed planning lies ahead, but we want to share with you the following:

- We have convened a joint task force, named Project Solel (Hebrew for blazing a new path forward!). Members include Stuart Anfang, Maxine Bernstein, Beth Chafetz, Jeff Cossin, Meredith Dragon, Paul Farkas, Rabbi Amy Wallk Katz, Marianne Kornblum, Lisa Levheim, Caryn Resnick, Rabbi Mark Shapiro, Jody Smith, Billy Snow, Esta Sobey, Heather Sullivan, and Gloria Wald. We are consulting with Terry Rosenberg, a nationally recognized expert in synagogue strategic planning and transformation.
- We are not merging congregations, nor simply merging religious schools. We seek to create a joint educational enterprise that will provide a vibrant engaging education for our children, strengthening our community while maintaining the individual identities and traditions of each synagogue.
- There is no definitive start date for the new school. The earliest possible date would be fall 2016; however, we are all strongly committed to a thoughtful, sensible, and unrushed process, and will take the time necessary to launch this program successfully. We expect that many of our current teaching staff will be actively involved with the new program.
- We will keep our community updated on our progress and plans. If you have specific questions or comments, please feel free to contact (for Sinai bulletin—Beth Chafetz, Jeff Cossin, or Rabbi Shapiro) (for TBE bulletin—Stuart Anfang, Paul Farkas, or Rabbi Katz).

The Sustaining Membership Program

We are organizing differently this year.

By the time this bulletin arrives in Sinai homes, separate letters should be arriving in the homes of all those congregants who are currently Sustaining Membership participants. We are hoping you will continue your SMP involvement into the 2015/2016 fiscal year. (Last year's Celebrate Today/Create Tomorrow Campaign actually depends on the continuing health of the Sustaining Membership Program.)

But what if you aren't already in SMP? What is SMP?

If you are among those congregants who pay full dues in your category, you might consider becoming a Sustaining Member of Sinai.

A Sustaining Member is someone who chooses to offer Sinai an extra amount of funds beyond dues. During the current fiscal year, 95 Sinai households became Sustaining Members and contributed \$65,000 to our budget.

By doing this, Sustaining Members help reduce the need to raise the fees for Temple members who cannot afford full dues. By assuming a kind of "fair share," the Sustaining Members also allow Sinai to continue to offer a full and varied menu of programs.

The levels of involvement are below. Each level assumes a member paying his/her dues and then adding on to those dues the following amounts.
