You're on an airplane - probably squeezed into a narrow seat...the engines roaring in your ears. But truth to tell, it's not that bothersome. Some people are sleeping; some are talking with the passenger beside them. Other people are reading. It's almost peaceful.

And then the plane lands.

Within seconds, people pull out their phones, BlackBerries, and all manner of electronic devices. The moment the plane comes to a stop you hear the machines coming to life. 10...20...30 people hook up to the outside world almost frantically beginning to talk, make an appointment or do business.

I'm picturing this scene because I've been thinking a lot about the frenzy that characterizes our lives. We are connected to our world and our schedules these days with barely any room for ourselves. That is why I am very interested in exploring Judaism's oldest antidote to exhaustion. It's called Shabbat.

On Yom Kippur, I hope you will join me in thinking creatively about the way we live our lives. At that time, I am going to introduce a theme for our community entitled – Take Back Your Time: Rediscover Shabbat. I guarantee this will not be the "usual" message from the bimah. I've actually worked with several groups of Sinai congregants over the summer to develop new ideas about our use of time. At the suggestion of these congregants, we are even including a copy of my Yom Kippur sermon from last year that dealt with Shabbat. We invite you to read that 2007 sermon in preparation for my 2008 sermon.

When the plane touches down at Sinai on Yom Kippur, let's revisit Shabbat and our busy lives. I believe we have some important work to do. It's time for us to "take back our time and rediscover Shabbat."



Birthright – A FREE Israel trip if you're between 18 and 26

When I signed up for the Birthright trip called Israeloutdoors- Israel By Foot, I had no idea what kind of experience I was in for.

I was lucky enough to travel to Israel when I was nine years old with my family. However, even though I revisited many of the same sites, my experience this summer was very different. This trip, I was able to see the sights from a new perspective; not only from a more mature perspective, but also from a more involved perspective. Almost everyday of the trip, with the exception of Shabbat, we would go for a hike in whatever part of the country we were in. Each hike was usually about six hours long and encompassed some of the most amazing views I have ever seen. We hiked in places such as the Lower Galilee, the Golan Heights and the Negev. Some hikes involved hiking by water where would have to work as a group to try and cross the rivers, while other hikes were in places where water was hard to find.

Some of my favorite memories include watching the sunrise from the top of Masada, sleeping under the stars in the desert, covering myself in mud from the Dead Sea, and repelling into a canyon in the Negev. I remember that we got a late start when we were heading out to Masada. We only had half an hour until sunrise and it was at least a forty-five minute hike to the top. I was determined to make it to the top for sunrise and I hiked up the path in under twenty minutes to get there right before the sun rose.

I also remember when we were camping in the desert we had the option of sleeping inside tents but I did not want to. I was one of the few people who decided to sleep under the stars and I will never forget that experience. I had never seen so many stars in my life as I was falling asleep that night. I woke up at one point just before dawn and looked up to see the sun start to rise above the mountains while the moon was still shining above a small town in the hills in the distance.

Besides the sites of the countryside, I was also able to learn a lot about Israel's history. We visited places like Yad Vashem, Independence Hall, and the Western Wall which were all unforgettable experiences. At Yad Vashem, we were able to listen to a Holocaust survivor's story and how she ended up fighting in the resistance and helping as a nurse after she escaped.

In addition to seeing historical sites, our group was expanded a few days into our trip when a group of ten Israeli soldiers joined us. It was a great learning experience to come to know each soldier and listen to what their lives are like in Israel as well as discuss topics such as the war and politics. It also made everything much more personal and real to us. When we visited Mount Herzl, where many soldiers are buried, we heard first hand accounts of how friends of the soldiers had died in battle and talked about their fears that accompany living in a country where everyone must serve in a time of war. I will never forget standing there with my group and all of us crying together over the graves of soldiers our age and even younger.

One of the most important parts of the trip to me was not what I saw or the places that I visited, but it was the people I met. I formed friendships with each person on my trip even though we were all so different. We were able to bond through our common experiences and by the end of the trip we were all one big family.

Thank you so much for helping me be able to come to camp this summer. As camp comes to an end, it is sad to think I will have to wait a whole year before I will be coming back. From trip days (Newport/Providence, RI 1st session and New York City 2nd session) to the 4th of July, and Israel Day to Maccabia, this has been a summer to remember.

Plant deciduous trees

Plant trees now on the south, east, and west sides of your house. In five years they may provide enough shade to let you run your air conditioner less frequently. When the trees mature, they could save you as much as 40% on your cooling costs. Beyond shading your property, trees also help combat the "heat island" effect that occurs in urban areas where concrete and asphalt absorb and hold in the heat. Two popular varieties are red oak for large lots (it grows to 70 feet tall) and trident maple for smaller ones. But before you buy any saplings check with your city/town public works department; some trees have invasive roots that plug water and sewer lines.

Insulate hot-water pipes

Without insulation, your house's hot-water pipes act as a gigantic radiator, transferring heat to the air so efficiently that any water in the pipes – even if it left the boiler at a toasty 105 degrees – is barely lukewarm 15 minutes later. So if you wash your hands to prep dinner, then need to rinse a pot, you'll have to wait for the hot water all over again. The solution: Insulate pipes whenever you can reach them by encasing them in rubber or polyethylene foam tubes. The tubes come with an adhesive-coated slit down the middle, so you can just ease them over th pipe and press the ends closed. Seal the seam with duct tape. Tests show that insulation can double the cool-down time in ½-inch pipe and triple it in ¾-inch pipe.

Question 1 May Be Dangerous to Your Health

Question 1 will appear on this November's ballot. It calls for the elimination of the state tax in Massachusetts. If passed, the state income tax would be eliminated immediately, costing the state 40% of its budget or over \$12 billion.

If passed, every community in the Commonwealth, will not be able to meet the most basic needs of its citizens. The ability to care for children, elderly, sick and needy is at stake. Without adequate fire and police protection, without safe roads and bridges, without snow plows on our streets, risk touches all. Without quality education, not only do children suffer, but the prospects for economic health grow even dimmer.
