The images are everywhere. The news is always on. It's hard to complain seriously that we've got it bad because of triple digit temperatures, when our brothers and sisters in Israel leave their homes by the thousands and spend weeks in shelters.

The images are everywhere. CNN can't seem to stop showing pictures of the Lebanese who are victims of this war. What happened in Kana seems to be the ultimate indictment of Israel.

But the images on television don't tell the whole story, and we Jews must not forget that. We mustn't forget that, only one day after Kana, Israel's papers and airwaves were filled with anguished debates about the moral implications of what had happened. In Israel's largest daily, the lead editorial proclaimed: "In a national sense, we are all guilty, because small nations are nations of collective responsibility. This killing is on the head of all of us." And it went on to say that what Israel must do is take responsibility and ask forgiveness.

Imagine hearing those words from either Hezbollah or Hamas? It wouldn't happen and it hasn't happened.

This war is tragic. This war is painful because it was initiated by Hezbollah and Hamas after Israel had evacuated the land both groups claim as their own.

But this war is also a struggle that Israel will not lose and cannot lose. It is a battle in which our people affirm their simple right TO BE. It is a battle during which we have to say again and again - Am Yisrael Chai - The People of Israel has a right to be. Israel is alive!

Sinai Temple High Holiday 2006 Ticket Policy

Ticket Requirements

- Tickets will be required for admission to each service.
- Tickets will be checked at the Temple entrance.
- Each member of the family should have his/her own ticket.

Tickets will be mailed automatically if any of the following are satisfied:

- A minimum of 2/3 of this year's dues, plus any past due amounts, have been paid.
- A payment schedule has been arranged with the treasurer or financial secretary.
- Arrangements have been made for credit card payments.

30 and Under membership category

- In order to open the Temple as much as possible to young Jews, we gladly welcome members who are 30 years of age or under.
- Individuals 30 or under may become members at no cost and, therefore, receive High Holidays tickets plus all other membership benefits.

Guest policy

- Members of other congregations affiliated with the URJ should ask for a seating request from their home temple for seating at Sinai Temple.
- Members may request complimentary tickets for their adult children and/or for out of town guests by completing a request form obtained from the Temple office. Guest's home addresses must be supplied.
- Households new to the Western Mass/ Northern Connecticut area, not affiliated with a synagogue, may receive complimentary High Holiday tickets once upon request. Households in the Western Mass/Northern Connecticut area who have been unaffiliated from a previous synagogue for more than one year may also receive complimentary High Holiday tickets once upon request.

Childcare

- Children under 5 must be left with babysitting services provided by Sinai Temple.
- Reservations are required.

Attending Services on the Telephone

Do you know someone who misses out on High Holiday Services because they are physically unable to attend? This year it will be possible to hear live Sinai Temple services by telephone from home or even from a hospital room. Sinai's Caring Community and TRZ Religious Services will be making this wonderful opportunity available.

This service is free of charge to members and will not be limited to the High Holidays. It can also be used to listen in on any service (i.e. Bar/Bat Mitzvah, wedding or funeral) that Rabbi Shapiro and Cantor Mekler lead from the bimah.

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Notes about the Holidays

Two Rosh Hashanah Morning Services 8:45 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. 11:00 a.m. to 1:20 p.m.

Although the first service is definitely NOT going to be a Family Service, it will be a service that welcomes school age children because it will be briefer. The second service will be *identical* to our usual holiday morning services with Rabbi, Cantor, choir, and the full liturgy.

Babysitting for Children through Kindergarten

Babysitting for small children ages two through Kindergarten (no infants) will be available during Rosh Hashanah morning and Yom Kippur morning services.

Child Programming for Grades One & Two

An age appropriate program for children in Grades 1 and 2 will be available during both Rosh Hashanah morning services and Yom Kippur morning. (The program is being offered parallel to the first Rosh Hashanah morning service for parents of these young children who do not think the children would feel comfortable even in the shorter first service format of 90 minutes.)

Children in Grades Three through Six

On Yom Kippur morning, we will be offering a service designed for this intermediate age group. Too old for a children's program; often too young for the full adult service. More information will follow.

The Mitzvah Habit: Help us feed the hungry

You can't miss it! Every time you enter the Temple, you see the box for THE OPEN PANTRY on the floor outside the Temple office. Sometimes the box is full; sometimes it's fairly empty. But every week the Open Pantry truck comes by to scoop up whatever the box contains and take it back to the Open Pantry.

You can help keep the box full. Here's how. Whenever you go shopping, buy an extra non-perishable food item. Then whenever you come to the Temple, bring along your food item and drop it in the box. If you're coming to a meeting or services, if you've got business in the office, if your child is coming to Religious School, start a new MITZVAH HABIT. Bring some food along and place it in the box for the OPEN PANTRY.

From the President Steve Weiss

For the last several months, I was expecting that I would use this month's article to describe the experiences of our congregation's trip to Israel. Obviously, and unfortunately, we had to cancel (or at least postpone) the trip. It was an agonizing decision for all of us, especially for Rabbi Shapiro, who spent considerable time and energy planning the agenda; however, as events in the Middle East have unfolded, it was also clearly the correct decision to keep our families safe.

So I can't tell you what we saw, heard and learned while in Israel; however, the experience still provides me with opportunity for observation and reflection. While I was not literally looking skyward for Ketushah rockets, and while my family is not living in shelters, the attacks by Hezbollah have nonetheless affected the lives of my family. And it necessarily provides some perspective. We were anxious about whether to travel to a region in which we might not be safe, but we had a choice. Our fellow Jews in Haifa, Nahariya, and other communities in northern Israel didn't have that luxury. We may have lost some money because the trip was cancelled, but countless people in Israel have lost their businesses or have no jobs to go to. A day does not pass without me wondering and worrying about how those in the combat zones are coping with these terrible times.

As we enter the High Holy Day season, I hope you share my prayers that real and sustainable peace will come quickly to the land of Israel.

Here we are all ready to begin a new school year. There is so much excitement here with all the new programming. First, our new Hebrew curriculum. We will begin exposing our students to aleph/bet beginning right away in Kindergarten and first grade. How exciting for them! Then, beginning in grade 2 students will begin our new Mitkadem Curriculum. Beginning in grade 3, Mitkadem is an individualized curriculum, allowing students to move ahead at their own pace. It will allow us to meet the needs of all of our students. including those that are ready to just speed ahead and those who find learning Hebrew a challenge. This exciting program also allows us to meet the needs of those students who experience academic challenges due to learning disabilities. I am also off the map excited about our new eighth and ninth grade programming.

Our 8th grade students will continue their learning in a very different way. They will begin the year, traveling the community with Phyllis Katz, to learn about their Jewish Community. They will explore about how their own families arrived here in western Massachusetts, as well as the agencies and organizations that make up this vibrant community of ours. During the second half of the year, students will participate is SPARK/HeartAction. This program is a Jewish service learning program that integrates community service, volunteer skill development, Jewish text study, opportunities for reflection, and exploration of public policy and activism. Our facilitator for this program will be Aviva Hollenstein.

Our ninth graders will also be participating in a two semester program. During the first semester, students will have the opportunity to pilot a new program for URJ called Sacred Choices. This program explores sexuality and social relationships through a Jewish lens. The program is sensitive to students at this stage of development and supports their learning to make positive choices. During the second semester students will explore politics in Judaism. The year will culminate with a four day trip to the Religious Action Center in Washington D.C.

Along with all our regular exciting Religious School programming, this is going to be a fabulous year at Sinai Temple Religious School. I can't wait to see you all on September 10th!

Thanks for a Generous Response To the World Crisis Fund... Emergency Israel Campaign From Federation

As of early August, over \$6,000 had been donated by Sinai members for the World Crisis Fund. Since then, more funds have arrived. ALL these funds are being directed to those in Israel who can use them the best during the current crisis.

As of now, we have written THREE checks of \$2,000 each. Two of the checks are going to the Reform congregations of Haifa. The first is called the Leo Baeck Education Center; the second is called Congregation Or Chadash. Both Reform congregations have been actively involved in opening their doors to the entire Haifa community. During the last many weeks, Leo Baeck provided a day-time shelter for Haifa's children who would otherwise be isolated from each other in private shelters. Or Chadash has also followed a similar course,

The third donation went from us to Kibbutz Lotan, one of the two Reform kibbutzim in the Negev. Lotan has been hosting around 80 Israelis who have been displaced from communities in the north. Lotan has been spending about \$500 per day to open its doors.

Early in September we will make more disbursements to Israel from the World Crisis Fund. We will also be sharing more news about the national **Israel Emergency Campaign** which will be supported by our local Jewish Federation. The target in the Pioneer Valley will be \$1million. It will be a cash campaign because the situation is dire and the needs are immediate. 100% of the donations will provide support for the victims of violence. News about the Campaign will follow for everyone in the Jewish community.

Thank you to Don Gilman who was the architect for the building erected so proudly in 1949/1950 at 1100 Dickinson Street. Don was involved in the entire process of locating the land for the Temple and then following through on all the details of designing the core of our present building. Don now lives in Tucson.
