Some of you may have noticed an article that has appeared a few times in this year's Temple bulletins. The article has come under the heading - What Makes Me Happy about Sinai Temple

Each time that heading has appeared we have asked 4 or 5 congregants to describe why belonging to Sinai Temple pleases them.

It's been interesting to see how different people feel about belonging to Sinai. To be honest, I've sort of hoped that when you read someone else's endorsement of Sinai, you might think more actively about your own connection to the Temple.

That's important because we are living through a time of transition in which we are doing everything we can to make membership at Sinai Temple as meaningful and rewarding as possible. We want to retain every current member of the Temple. Better still, we want to recruit new members.

Part of the recruitment effort began in May and continues through the summer. We are collaborating with Temple Beth El and Congregation B'nai Torah in an outreach effort that involves some open houses at Starbucks and Bay Path College, an open house at each of the synagogues, plus a reduced membership rate for newcomers to synagogue life.

The synagogues in Springfield have never collaborated this extensively, but, as a result of many meetings for our leadership, we have forged this brand new alliance. We've set the stage better than ever before for a summer of membership recruitment.

There is only one missing ingredient: We need recruiters, supporters, and cheer leaders. That's where you, my dear readers, enter. Are you happy at Sinai? Are you proud of Sinai? If so, please don't keep it to yourself. Look at your friends and neighbors who don't belong to a synagogue. Speak to them. Invite them to a Sinai event. Ask them to call me. If they're willing, give me their number and I'll contact them.

I am very, very happy at Sinai Temple. I would be even happier if you join me and our Temple leadership in recruiting more happy members to Sinai. We do have empty seats. Let's fill them for the New Year. Have a happy June!

Notes from Cantor Martin Levson

It's been quite a year!

Ten months ago, most of Sinai Temple had never heard of Nava Tehila, Vocolot, or Sababa. What a difference ten months makes! In the middle of challenging economic times, how in the world did we bring in not one, not two, but THREE amazing Jewish musical groups? The answer is simple: we were able to do it thanks to your generosity. Because of generous donations, gracious sponsorships, and the use of designated program funds, Sinai Temple was able to bring three incredible Jewish musical ensembles to Springfield this past year. If you would like to help sponsor a musical event (perhaps in celebration of a simcha or in memory of a loved one) please let me know. I know LOTS of talented Jewish musicians, and I would love to bring them to Sinai. I hope that Sinai Temple of Springfield can continue to be a Jewish cultural center for Western Massachusetts, and, with your help, you can make this a reality!

On Friday, June 18, the Adult Volunteer Choir (along with some special guests) will present a musical program based on the sequence of the Kabbalat Shabbat Psalms. The musical settings run the gamut from choral arrangements to traditional cantorial nusach, from Jewish sacred chant to Chassidic melodies. In the words of the liturgical poem, L'cha Dodi, “Come, my friend, to greet the bride, come let us welcome Shabbat!” Please join us as we welcome Shabbat with wonderful music on June 18!

I have used the following phrase a great deal recently: “It's going to be a very short summer.” The High Holidays begin in early September. That means the High Holiday Choir will need to begin rehearsing on Wednesday, August 4! If you would like to sing with the choir, please call or e-mail me here at the Temple. Singing in the High Holiday Choir is a great way to learn more about the liturgy and theology of the Days of Awe, and we have a good time, too! The High Holiday Choir will sing for the evening services of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, so that choir members can sit with their friends and family during the morning services.

If you would like to chant Torah for Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur, now is the time to ask! I will provide volunteers with a CD (or mp3 files) to help you learn the portion. If you are interested, please let me know before June 18!

This month marks the conclusion of my second year as the Cantor of Sinai Temple. It has been a delightful first two years. I have been truly blessed to be able to be your Cantor, and I look forward (God willing) to serving as your Cantor for many, many years to come.

Hotel Travel Pledge A message from the Social Action Committee

The summer months and holiday vacations are fast approaching. Please consider the fact that the hotel workers where we stay are overworked and certainly underpaid. Just Journeys is a campaign from the Progressive Jewish Alliance, Jewish Funds for Justice and the National Jewish Labor Committee on behalf of hotel workers. The pledge involves three simple steps:

- **Be neat:** the most common injuries sustained by hotel workers, which can be life long, include injuries sustained cleaning. The rate of work related injuries for housekeepers is more than double other service injuries. Workers rush to complete work and frequently skip meals and breaks or stay late to finish quotas to maintain their jobs.

- **Leave a meaningful gratuity:** Show appreciation for the quality of service with both a tip and a complement. A suggested tip of \$2 per night per person. Hotel housekeepers frequently earn as little as \$8.50 /hr and rarely receive health insurance.

- **Support union labor:** Many hotel workers are organized, but plenty are not. Let the management know that you prefer to stay at a hotel that supports workers rights.

Enjoy your vacation but remember it is our responsibility to treat everyone with fairness and respect.

For Your Information: (Because You Have Asked)...Ask the Experts –

Freezing Smoked Salmon

Is it possible to freeze smoked salmon without the texture and flavor degrading?

You can freeze smoked salmon, although you may notice a slight deterioration in texture and flavor once it's thawed. This can be minimized by freezing the salmon for only a few months and thawing it slowly in the refrigerator. If the salmon has been frozen and then thawed, however, don't refreeze it. The texture and flavor will suffer and, more importantly, it could lead to food safety issues.
