Sinai Temple etin Take Back Your Time: Rediscover Shabbat

For Your Consideration

There probably aren't too many Sinai congregants who lie awake at night wondering if God does or doesn't exist. Very few of us probably anguish over God's presence or absence on a regular basis. We are not primarily theologians.

And yet the results of last year's God Survey do indicate that, although Sinai congregants don't regularly worry about God, Sinai congregants do ask serious questions about life and its purpose. Last year when the survey asked what kinds of questions you might want to ask God, many people asked questions like these: "What do you want me to do with my life? How can I find peace."

It was as if thinking about God led people beyond God. Considering God becomes a kind of shorthand for pondering the ultimate questions of existence.

That is why I hope you'll be interested in two visitors to Sinai during October. Each will teach on a Saturday morning in place of Torah Study. I've invited each of them to talk about God, although I think the topic will actually lead way beyond God. If you believe a lot or a little, you'll be intrigued. If you are someone who sticks to reason, one of the speakers is for you. If you feel more poetic and more open to talk about faith, the other speaker is for you.

Actually, both are terrific and I've invited them because I'm not even sure which one will touch me more. I just know the debate will be important. There are always new ways to unpack the curious and mysterious notions of God and faith.

Visit on Saturday, October 20 to hear Rabbi Sheila Weinberg. Her topic...From the Heart: A Spiritualist Looks at God. Visit on October 27 to hear Rabbi Rifat Sonsino. His topic... From the Head: A Rationalist Looks at God.

From the Heart: A Spiritualist Looks at God Saturday morning, October 20 from 9 to 10:30 a.m.


Rabbi Sheila Weinberg has served in multiple capacities in the Jewish community including Hillel director, day school teacher and community relations professional. She graduated from the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College and was rabbi at the Jewish Community of Amherst.

She has a special interest in mindfulness, yoga, and meditation and teaches for the Institute for Jewish Spirituality.

She has written extensively on Jewish spirituality, social justice, feminism and parenting. She is a major contributor to the Kol Haneshamah prayer book series. Her first book, Surprisingly Happy: An Atypical Religious Memoir was published in 2010.

Weinberg is not a rationalist and will speak about her approach to faith when

From the Head: A Rationalist Looks at God Saturday morning, October 27 from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

Rabbi Rifat Sonsino, LLB, Ph.D., D.D, is Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Beth Shalom, Needham, MA and a faculty member at Boston College's Theology Department. Born in Turkey, he studied at Hebrew Union College for the rabbinate and received his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania. He has served congregations from Argentina to Boston.

His articles on Bible and Judaica have appeared in many scholarly journals. He has written the books Finding God: Selected Responses, What Happens After I Die? Jewish Views of Life After Death, and Six Jewish Spiritual Paths: A Rationalist Looks at Spirituality.

Sonsino is a rationalist and will talk with us about his "rational" faith.



The Time Capsules of the Warsaw Ghetto: On the Seventieth Anniversary - The Secret Archive Revealed Sunday morning, November 4 at 9:15 a.m. Dr. Samuel Kassow, Trinity College

(Sponsored by Men of Sinai. Breakfast will be served.)

Samuel Kassow is the world's leading authority on Emanuel Ringelblum, who established a secret organization named Oyneg Shabes in Nazi-occupied Warsaw in 1940. Retrieved after World War II from metal boxes and milk cans buried beneath the ruins of the Warsaw ghetto, the Oyneg Shabes-Ringelblum Archive records and preserves the fate of Polish Jewry.

A prolific author, Professor Kassow's Who Will Write Our History? Emanuel Rinelblum, the Warsaw Ghetto, and the Oyneg Shabes Archive (2007) received the Orbis

Prize and was a finalist for a National Jewish Book Award. A child of Holocaust survivors, Professor Kassow was born in a Displaced Persons camp in Germany. Kassow is Professor of History in Trinity College, holds a Ph.D. from Princeton University, and is a consultant to the Museum of the History of Polish Jews to be built in Warsaw.

Bring yourselves and your older children to any congregational Shabbat service and get the feeling of Sinai's community in worship.






